Latest developments on LINks

Funding for each area announced

The Government has published how much communities will receive to run their LINk over the next three years.

Unveiled as part of the Local Government Finance Settlement announced in Parliament, the Department of Health has written to local authorities to tell them how much they will receive from 2008-2011.

Amounting nationally to over £80 million, the grant each area will receive will depend on factors such as population and levels of poverty.

Consultation reminder

The Department of Health threemonth consultation on the draft regulations for LINks is due to end on the 21st Dec. Many responses have already received but the Government would still like to hear more views.

The Local Government and Public Involvement in Health Act empowers the Secretary of State to introduce secondary legislation to ensure that LINks can hold local care services to account.

These proposals include:

>Placing a duty on service providers to provide LINks with information they request;

>Placing a duty on commissioners to respond within a certain timeframe to reports and recommendations made by LINks;

>Placing a duty on service providers to allow members of LINks to enter and view services; and

>Enabling LINks to refer issues to a local authority Health Overview and Scrutiny Committee (OSC) for action.

The draft regulations, which set out how the duties will work in practice, have been published in a document called 'Have your say - Consultation on the regulations for Local Involvement Networks (LINks)'. This document sets out the regulations, explains how they will work and asks for your views.

During the passage of the Act, further provisions were made to introduce a transitional duty on local authorities to make sure there is no gap between Forum and LINk activities and to allow regulations to be made about governance arrangements for LINks. Given the late stage at which these provisions were introduced, these regulations are not part of the formal consultation but Government will be discussing them with key stakeholders in the New Year.

TUPE clarification

Does TUPE (Transfer of Undertakings) apply in the transfer of responsibilities from CPPIH and 'Forum Support Organisations' to other bodies?

Local authorities are currently going through the process of procuring host arrangements for LINks and many are considering whether TUPE may be an issue. Stakeholders may be interested to note that the Department has recently taken advice on the matter and is of the view that TUPE is unlikely to apply.

The reason for this is that the abolition of CPPIH and Patients' Forums and the setting up of LINKs is unlikely to involve a transfer of an undertaking to which the TUPE Regulations could apply. Even if

there were such a transfer, it may well be a transfer of functions between public administrative bodies and TUPE does not apply to such a transfer. However, it is for each local authority to form its own view as to the application of TUPE to the arrangements for LINKs that it is setting up.

Briefing on duty to involve

The NHS legal duty to consult the public on the planning and development of services has been updated. The new 'Duty to involve' (known as 'section 242') has been refined to reflect the new commissioning-led NHS and to broaden out the way the NHS involves citizens. Involvement to Impact winner

Howard Street Community Health Centre, East Lancashire Primary Care Trust has been named the Overall Winner at the NHS Centre for Involvement's first annual Involvement to Impact Awards.

people in the development of the
health centre and the services it
provides. In partnership with their
local community the health centre
has become a true focal point of the
community which offers a holistic
approach to health and wellbeing.

Judging the overall award winner, David Nicholson, Chief Executive of the NHS said, "We know that care improves when we really listen to what our patients and our communities have to say about the healthcare they expect and receive.

"These awards highlight some excellent examples of really listening to and involving patients, carers, service users and whole communities in designing and developing health care, and the organisation that takes the Involvement to Impact Award, is, I believe, an outstanding example of this work."

There were over 130 entries from a variety of organisations that focus on involvement activities as a way to make changes in the delivery of NHS services and decision making.

The focus of these awards was to demonstrate how NHS staff and organisations have worked with patients and the public as equal partners and how this involvement has impacted health service planning, design and evaluation of new and existing services.
